# THE PBMAFIA: Takeaways

## THE BASICS

**Pharmacy Benefit Manager (PBM)** = a company that manages prescription drug benefits on behalf of health insurers, Medicare Part D drug plans, large employers, and other payers" (The Commonwealth Fund, 2019)

- The "middleman" between pharmacy providers and payers (state & federal governments, private insurance companies & large employers)
- Responsibilities include:
  - Automated processing of Rx claims → under-reimburse pharmacy providers for services rendered, DIR fees ("clawbacks") on Medicare claims
  - Creating "formulary" of covered drugs for payers → control what drugs are accessible to/affordable for patients (e.g., forcing patients to take expensive brand-name drugs)
  - Negotiating rebates with drug manufacturers → keep rebates as profit
  - Creating pharmacy networks → "patient steering" to pharmacies they own/operate
  - Reviewing drug utilization
  - Managing mail order & specialty pharmacies > own/operate low-quality pharmacies that patients are often "steered" to

**PBM abuse** = umbrella term referring to the ways in which the PBM industry abuses the American healthcare system in both ethically questionable and outright illegal ways

• Who suffers? The **"3 P's"** = <u>patients</u>, <u>p</u>roviders & <u>p</u>ayers

The "big 3" PBMs = CVS Caremark, Express Scripts & OptumRx

- Together account for ~80% of entire PBM market
- Others include Humana, MedImpact & Prime Therapeutics

Pharmacy desert = a community or neighborhood with limited access to pharmacy care

- Technical definition first devised by Dr. Dima Qato, Assistant Professor, Dept. of Pharmacy Systems, Outcomes & Policy at the University of Illinois Chicago (UIC)
  - Rural  $\rightarrow$  no pharmacy within 10 miles
  - Urban (limited vehicle access/using public transit)  $\rightarrow$  no pharmacy within 0.5 miles
  - Urban (adequate vehicle access)  $\rightarrow$  no pharmacy within 1 mile
- Why can't <u>chain</u> & <u>mail order</u> pharmacies bridge this gap in care?
  - Chain pharmacies closing widely across the nation due to: growing competition, changing consumer behaviors, retail crime, staffing shortages, minimal store investment, comedown from COVID pandemic-era sales
    - Have a tendency to enter a community, stay long enough for independent pharmacy(ies) to close, then leave when retailers want to offload them
  - **Mail order pharmacies** are cumbersome, confusing & known for providing low-quality care. They're also only an option for filling maintenance medications (e.g., no antibiotics, new prescriptions that must be started right away).

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Combat lack of awareness/understanding of this issue through patient education
- Legislative advocacy at the state AND federal level

- Patronize independent pharmacies, even if you're not their prescription patient (e.g., purchasing OTC items, vaccination)
- Choose your insurance company wisely (and/or participate in self-pay pharmacy)
